



Campbell McLachlan QC is Professor of International Law at Victoria University of Wellington. He is New Zealand Law Foundation International Research Fellow and sometime visiting Fellow at All Souls College Oxford. He is internationally-known for his work on systemic integration in treaty interpretation for the International Law Commission and for his treatise on investment treaty law (with Shore & Weiniger) *International Investment Arbitration: Substantive Principles*. He has published widely on international law and dispute resolution, giving a special course at The Hague Academy of International Law on *Lis Pendens* in International Litigation. He has served as President of the Australian and New Zealand Society of International Law and Rapporteur of the ILA Committee on International Civil and Commercial Litigation. He is Joint Editor-in-Chief of *ICSID Review—Foreign Investment Law Journal*; a specialist editor of *Dicey Morris & Collins on the Conflict of Laws*; and a member of the editorial advisory boards of the *ICLQ* and the *Journal of International Dispute Settlement*. His scholarly research is also informed by practice. Formerly a partner and head of the Public International Law practice in Herbert Smith (London), he is now an associate member of Essex Court Chambers (London) and Bankside Chambers (Auckland & Singapore). He has been frequently appointed as an arbitrator in investor-state disputes by the Permanent Court of Arbitration and the International Centre for the Settlement of Investment Disputes. His most recent book, informed by his research and his practical experience, is *Foreign Relations Law* (Cambridge UP, published in August 2014). It is the first modern study of the treatment of the foreign state (and the external powers of the home state) in Anglo-Commonwealth law.



Linda J. Silberman is the Martin Lipton Professor of Law at New York University and Co-Director of the Center. She is a leading figure in the United States in private international law and transnational litigation, and her academic and scholarly interests range from numerous areas of commercial law to personal and family matters. At NYU, Professor Silberman teaches a range of courses, including Civil Procedure, Comparative Procedure, Conflict of Laws, International Litigation/Arbitration and International Commercial Arbitration. She is co-author of an important Civil Procedure casebook (now in its 3rd edition) and of a recent book on Comparative Civil Procedure. She was the co-Reporter for the American Law Institute Project--Recognition and Enforcement of Foreign Judgments: Analysis and Proposed Federal Statute, and an adviser to two other American Law Institute projects: Intellectual Property: Principles Governing Jurisdiction, Choice of Law and Judgments in Transnational Disputes and the Restatement Third on International Commercial Arbitration. Professor Silberman is also a Member of the State Department's Advisory Committee on Private International Law and has been a member of numerous U.S. State Department delegations to the Hague Conference. Professor Silberman combines her scholarship and academic work with other roles, such as special referee, expert witness and consultant in a number of important cases. Her work was cited by the Supreme Court of the United States on several occasions.



Harold Hongju Koh is Sterling Professor of International Law at Yale Law School, where he served as Dean (2004-09) and is formerly Legal Adviser to the U.S. Department of State (2009-13) and Assistant Secretary of State for Democracy, Human Rights and Labor (1998-2001). He is the author of *Transnational Litigation in U.S. Courts* (2008), co-author of *Transnational Business Problems* (5th ed. 2014 with Vagts, Dodge, and Buxbaum), and *Transnational Legal Problems* (3d ed. 1995 with Steiner & Vagts) and author of many articles on international and foreign relations law. He is also a member of the Council of the American Law Institute and Counselor to the Restatement (Fourth) of the Foreign Relations Law of the United States.
